## **Winter Preparation**

It's January, and the cold has finally set in for Gaston County. The middle of winter tends to be a slow time for most of our growers. That being said there are still beneficial things that commercial growers, and home growers can be doing to prepare for a busy spring. Soil testing is probably the most overlooked component in Spring preparation. A grower cannot manage what they do not know.

#### **Why Soil Test**

Fertilizer prices are currently very high; a soil test may indicate that there is little need to pay for certain nutrients that are not necessary this season. If you haven't tested in a while or are growing in a new area, a soil test may save you some headache later on in the season by getting things on track for a successful growing season. Many samples have been brought in after problems have occurred that could have been prevented with regular testing. Lawns and gardens have been particularly susceptible to over liming without a proper recommendation. There are environmental concerns with the over application of phosphorus and nitrogen. A soil test can help limit contributions to the pollution of water resources within our county.
